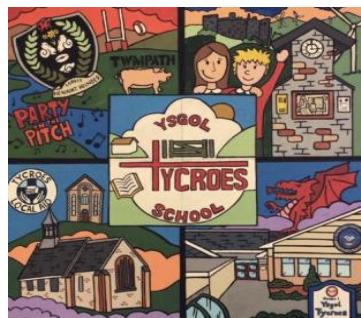

## How to apply for a place at Ysgol Tycroes/Sut i gyflwyno cais am le yn Ysgol Tycroes

Our school is a mixed community primary school which caters for approximately 200 pupils between 4 and 11 years old. To apply for a place for your child at Ysgol Tycroes, simply complete the online form which can be found on the Carmarthenshire website at [www.carmarthenshire.gov.uk](http://www.carmarthenshire.gov.uk)

Once your place has been confirmed by the Admissions Department, a start date can be arranged. Children can join us the term after their fourth birthday.

## School Uniform/Gwisg Ysgol

Our school uniform is supplied by Dyfed Menswear and consists of a red or grey jumper/cardigan, red or white polo top and dark bottoms. It is not essential for all polo tops or jumpers to have the school logo on them, but it is useful to have one piece of clothing with a logo which can be worn for visits or events. For safety reasons children are not permitted to wear jewellery, but small stud earrings are acceptable. Children should wear appropriate clothing for PE lessons consisting of a red T-shirt, black bottoms and suitable footwear. For outdoor PE sessions, suitable sportswear can be worn.

Our Year 6 children have the opportunity to wear a 'Year 6 Leavers' hoodie which is a different colour to the usual school uniform and helps them to feel special in their final year of Primary School.



## School Day/Diwrnod Ysgol

Our Breakfast Club initiative allows all pupils to receive a free breakfast each school day. The club is open from 8:15 am until 8:45 am (last serving of breakfast 8:30am). Pupils are supervised by our canteen and supervisory staff.

## Attendance/Presenoldeb

If your child is absent, it is essential that you contact the school as soon as is possible to confirm the absence. Parents can phone, message or email the school to confirm the pupil's absence. If your child is absent and the school has not been contacted to provide a reason for this, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence. Holidays will be authorised for up to 10 days if your child's attendance is above 90% upon completion of a holiday request form which can be obtained from the school office. Any holidays taken outside this 10-day period, or in the case of poor attendance, this will be recorded as an unauthorised absence.

If your child is absent due to sickness or diarrhoea, they should not return to school until 48 hours after the final episode.



Our registers remain open for 5 minutes every morning and afternoon. Pupils arriving after these times should be signed in by an adult at the main school office. All children must be signed out if leaving early for an appointment, and appointment letters/cards may be requested. In Dosbarth Dulais and Dosbarth Gwili (Years 5 and 6) pupils may walk home providing they have written permission from a parent. In the Foundation Learning classes, children will not be allowed to leave the building until a parent or guardian has arrived. **Please inform us if someone else will be collecting your child.**

### Inclement Weather/Tywydd Gwael

Every effort is made to keep the school open during inclement weather, but in severe cases in which we have to send the children home early, we will contact you beforehand. When school closure occurs, information will be available through the following methods of communications:

## Pupil Voice/Llais y Disgybl

Children have the opportunity to be part of our Pupil Voice groups including the School Council, Eco-Committee, Sports Ambassadors, Bronze Ambassadors, Digital Dragons, Criw Cymraeg, Head Boy and Head Girl and our team of prefects. All groups meet to consider suggestions on how we can improve and develop our school.

## School Dinners/Cinio Ysgol

School dinners are available daily and priced for these can be obtained by contacting the school. Menus are distributed at the beginning of each term and are also available on the Carmarthenshire Website. All children in primary school are entitled to receive free school meals as part of the Universal Free School Meals provision. However, if you feel that you may be eligible for means-tested free school meals then we can signpost you to where to apply. Successful applications will also allow you to access reduced costs for school trips and events, uniform and more!

All school meals should be booked through Parent Pay, particularly if your child has food allergies or dietary requirements, and all payments are also made through Parent Pay.

Packed lunches should reflect our commitment to being a healthy school by limiting the number of treats and encouraging a healthy balanced approach. Fizzy drinks are not permitted as part of a packed lunch.

All pupils are requested to bring their own water bottles and are actively encouraged to drink water throughout the day. A snack is available at morning breaktime for a small charge, payable on Parent Pay.

## Curriculum/Cwricwlwm

At Ysgol Tygroes, we deliver the Curriculum for Wales, underpinned by the Four Purposes which encourage children to be:

- Ambitious, capable learners who are ready to learn throughout their lives.
- Enterprising, creative contributors who are ready to play a full part in life and work.
- Ethical, informed citizens who are ready to be citizens of Wales and the world.
- Healthy, confident individuals who are ready to lead fulfilling lives as valued members of society.

The children experience a thematic approach which incorporates all Areas of Learning and Experience.

- Language, Literacy and Communication (including Welsh and Modern Foreign Languages)
- Maths and Numeracy
- Science and Technology
- Expressive Arts
- Humanities
- Health and Wellbeing



Throughout these areas, the children will also be developing their skills in literacy, numeracy and digital competency. More information about Curriculum for Wales can be found on the Welsh Government Website.



## The Journey Through School/Y Daith Drwy'r Ysgol.

In the Foundation Learning classes, the emphasis is on the children learning through play with an enabling adult. The children are provided with opportunities to gain first hand experiences by becoming actively involved in their learning, both within the indoor and outdoor environment. The aim is to develop the following:

- Skills and understanding across a range of areas of learning and experience
- Personal, social, emotional, physical and intellectual well-being
- Positive attitudes towards learning, promoting an enjoyment and desire to find out more
- Self-esteem and self-confidence to take controlled risks, explore, experiment, investigate and form new relationships
- Creativity and the ability to express themselves
- Problem solving skills
- Respect for themselves, others and the environment

As children move through the school, the learning continues to follow an approach which allows them to further develop their skills and knowledge across all areas of learning and experience, building on their previous learning to make progress. Learning also focuses on the essential skills of literacy, numeracy and digital competency. Children are also encouraged to develop self-confidence, independence in their learning, problem solving, creativity and deeper thinking skills. Children will also have the opportunity to take part in activities which make use of the outdoors and encourage entrepreneurship and engagement in real life, authentic activities.



## Homework/Gwaith Cartref

Homework is a valuable tool which can support and consolidate the learning in school. At Ysgol Tycroes, homework is based on maths fluency and literacy, but may also include research, completing an online activity, editing and improving a piece of work.

## English & Literacy/Saesneg a Llythrennedd



Phonics is taught using a lively, systematic phonics programme. This is introduced within the Foundation Learning classes and used as an intervention tool across junior classes to support children in their reading, writing and spelling development. All

children across the school also implement strategies from Pie Corbett's 'Talk for Writing' to enable them to develop their skills in literacy, enabling them to read and write independently for a variety of audiences and purposes within different subjects. A range of reading resources and strategies are used to encourage fluency and comprehension skills including e-books which can be accessed using the Oxford Owl library, along with guided, shared and individual reading activities.

## Maths & Numeracy/Mathemateg a Rhifedd

Abacus Maths is used to plan and teach maths and this platform also provides children with a range of online interactive maths activities to further develop their skills and knowledge of mathematical concepts. Complete Maths is also used across the school as a



diagnostic tool to identify and address any gaps in maths understanding. Children are given opportunities to develop their numeracy skills through taking part in regular reasoning and problem-solving activities and then are applied through real life, rich tasks.

### ICT and Hwb/TGC a Hwb



Hwb is the digital platform for learning and teaching across Wales. It provides its users with access to a range of bilingual, digital tools and resources. It enables learners to access online resources anywhere and from any device. Children have access to tools which enable word processing, making presentations, generating databases, compiling spreadsheets, coding, animation and much more whilst being safe for our learners to use. As well as developing digital competency, we also prioritise educating children about how to stay safe online.

### Welsh and Cwricwlwm Cymreig

In line with Welsh Government guidance (October 2022) all schools and Local Authorities in Wales must inform of the language in which they intend to teach. This also is considered alongside the following initiatives:

- Carmarthenshire County Council Welsh in Education Strategic Plan (WESP) statutory document.
- The contribution to the aim of nurturing a million Welsh speakers by 2050.





- Proposals to teach the Languages and Communications Area of Learning and Experience of the new Curriculum for Wales.
- The promotion of the Well-being of Future Generations Act.

As a result, there is a clear expectation that all schools will develop provision that increases the use of Welsh in the formal and extra-curricular curriculum, as a means of achieving the County's recognised 10-year WESP between 2022-2032.

**The current linguistic category for Ysgol Tycroes is Category 1: English Medium.** This can be summed up as follows:

- English is the main language for internal communication in the school as well as communication with parents and carers.
- It recognises that creating a Welsh ethos within the school will support and encourage positive attitudes towards the use of Welsh.
- A learner in a school of this category will be able to read, write, speak and listen in English according to their age and ability, and will have some understanding of the Welsh language.
- The Welsh language is taught and assessed as part of the Area of Learning and Experience for languages, literacy and communication.



- At least 15% of learners' school activities (curricular and extra-curricular) will be in Welsh.

At Ysgol Tycroes, we celebrate a Welsh ethos and our role within a community in Wales by providing opportunities to promote 'Y Cwricwlwm Cymrieg'.

We do this by emphasising the importance of the language through the use of incidental Welsh in day-to-day routines, by instilling an awareness of our local area and wider Wales, and by celebrating the Welsh culture. We are also proud to have achieved the Siarter Iaith Silver Award and are working towards our gold!

### Additional Learning Needs (ALN) /Anghenion Dysgu Ychwanegol (ADY)

Ay Ysgol Tycroes, we are committed to ensuring that all pupils have access to learning experiences which aim to meet the educational, social and personal needs of all pupils so that they may achieve their full potential. Where children are not making sufficient progress, a range of intervention opportunities are available to support them in reaching their personalised targets.

Pupils included on the ALN register are provided with Individual Development Plans (IDPs) which are created and agreed in partnership with parents/carers and other relevant professionals and is overseen by the Additional Learning Needs Coordinator (ALNCo).

### Additional Provision/Darpariaeth Ychwanegol

The school liaises closely with the County Educational Psychology Service and other external agencies in order to ensure that all pupils are supported appropriately throughout their school life. We work closely with support groups including Social Services, the Early Help Hub, Area 43, and the school nurse to ensure that we can support children and their families as a home-school community partnership.





We offer a range of programmes to support children in their personal and social development including Positive Play and Trauma Informed Schools (TIS) strategies, and children also have access to an ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistant) teaching assistant to help them discuss and work through any concerns or anxieties.

There are also opportunities for children to engage in peripatetic music lessons, sporting activities and other extra-curricular clubs to further develop their specific talents.

### School Excursions/Ymweliadau Ysgol

During the school year, there are opportunities for pupils to experience a number of educational visits which support the learning within class. Parents are informed of these visits by letter and must return the consent form prior to the visit. Parents will be asked for a voluntary financial contribution towards educational visits or events. No child will ever be excluded from participating in an educational activity as a result of non-payment.

Pupils in the juniors will have the opportunity to attend a residential visit for one or two nights. We are currently working with the Urdd centres of Pentre Ifan in Cardiganshire and Glan-Llyn Outdoor Adventure Centre near Y Bala in North Wales. Activities include canoeing, orienteering, archery, fencing, climbing, paddle-boarding, abseiling, high ropes, raft building, dry slope skiing and much more!



As a school, we are very mindful of the financial pressures on families when it comes to educational and residential visits. We strongly believe that these opportunities are so important in providing our children with positive and enjoyable experiences, and so we would urge that any parents who are facing challenging financial circumstances to discuss this with the Headteacher as there are a range of options available so that your child does not miss out. All conversations will be strictly confidential.



### Music, Art and Drama/Cerddoriaeth, Celf a Drama

The Arts play an important role in the life of Ysgol Tycroes. We encourage all children to take part in a wide range of music, drama and art/craft opportunities including Urdd competitions and events, school productions and concerts, performing within the local community and a range of extra-curricular activities, as well as our annual celebration of artistic talents in 'Tycroes Has Got Talent!'

A variety of instrumental lessons are offered including guitar, woodwind and percussion. There is a minimal charge for instrumental tuition, and further information about these costs can be obtained from the school.



## Sport/Chwaraeon

Sport is also an integral part of life in Ysgol Tycroes. Our aim is to develop general and specific skills across various sporting disciplines. We also have links with Tycroes Rugby club and other local sports providers, and we actively encourage and support children to get involved with our local community sports clubs.

Sports activities provided in school include:

- Extra-curricular sports clubs
- Urdd competitions and tournaments
- Inter-school tournaments
- Sessions with external providers including OT Ysgolion, Ysgol Dyffryn Aman and Activ
- A range of sports skills developed through the curriculum



In addition, pupils are selected to undertake the Bronze Ambassador and Sports Leaders Programmes which encourage communication and teamwork in leading activities with peers and younger children through being positive role models. The programmes also encourage increased activity in children, the importance of healthy choices, and the positive values of sport.

## Active Journeys/Teithiau Iach

Ysgol Tycroes champions the Sustrans Active Journeys to School initiative with an aim to encourage more children to travel to school by bike, scooter or on foot. Active travel to school is proven to improve the health of children by preventing obesity, reducing congestion and carbon emissions around schools and increasing concentration in the



classroom. We are delighted to have achieved the Silver Schools Sustrans Active Journeys Award – the first school in Carmarthenshire to have been awarded this!

### Religious Education/Addysg Grefyddol

Religious Education and Collective Worship is broadly of a Christian nature, but the children are also introduced to other religions, festivals and beliefs in order to foster understanding and tolerance.

At Ysgol Tycroes, there is much to be thankful for, much to celebrate and praise, and much to hope for. Through daily acts of collective worship, we focus on the development of children's spiritual, moral, and cultural development through stories and activities. We promote respect and sensitivity for the beliefs and values of others whilst providing opportunities for the children to reflect on their own beliefs and values, and those of the whole school community in their own way. Local clerics or organisations visit the school to lead collective worship during the year.

As well as acts of collective worship, Ysgol Tycroes holds a weekly 'Achievement Assembly' which celebrates the positive achievements that have happened during the week. These achievements can be from within school or from outside of school, and the children are encouraged to bring in any medals or certificates to be presented in assembly. Each class also nominates a 'Seren Yr Wythnos' ('Star of the Week') and 'Siaradwr Cymraeg Gwych' (Welsh Speaker of the Week) fortnightly, and these are published on the weekly newsletter. We also have a weekly recipient of the 'Headteacher Award' and a termly 'Pupil of the Term' nominated by the staff to recognise an outstanding contribution to the school in terms of effort, progress and

conduct. Attendance is also celebrated for both classes and individuals.

### Equal Opportunities/Cyfleodd Cyfartal

At Ysgol Tycroes, we are committed to ensure that all children and members of our school community are treated with equity and equality of opportunity regardless of ability, gender, race, sexuality, culture or religion.

The school is fully accessible to any child or adult with a physical disability. At Ysgol Tycroes we are committed to providing a fully accessible environment which values and includes all pupils, staff, parents and visitors regardless of their educational, physical, sensory, social, spiritual, emotional and cultural needs. We are further committed to challenge attitudes about disabilities and accessibility, and developing a culture of awareness, tolerance and inclusion.

### Relationships and Sexuality Education (RSE)/ Addysg Rhyw

The Welsh Government have committed to covering the following themes in RSE: relationships; rights and equity; sex, gender and sexuality; bodies and body image; sexual health and well-being; and violence, safety and support. As a school we have adopted the Jigsaw Scheme of work to support tailored delivery of RSE which is appropriate to every age and stage. Relationships and Sexuality Education is part of the curriculum in Wales and schools in Wales must teach RSE from September 2022. The Children's Commissioner for Wales supports the inclusion of Relationships and Sexuality Education in the Curriculum and Assessment (Wales) Act 2021. This law will make sure all children and young people have opportunities to develop their understanding of relationships and sexuality. This will help empower

children and young people with the understanding and skills they need to make informed choices and to be happy, healthy and safe. We understand that the delivery of RSE can cause some anxiety for parents, and so we would encourage you to come and discuss any concerns with us and to view the materials we use to teach this area.

### Health and Welfare/Iechyd a Lles

Please note that smoking is not allowed on school premises, including the yard. Also, no dogs are allowed on school premises.

### Fire Drills/Dril Tân

The staff and children take part in a fire drill at least once a term.

### School Security/Diogelwch yr Ysgol

In order to protect the pupils and staff at the school, all visitors to the premises must report to the school office and sign in using the school electronic signing in system. Parents are asked to make arrangements to see staff out of school hours as an impromptu visit may disrupt a class lesson. For the safety of all pupils, parents are requested to inform the school if there is a change in personnel for the collection of their child. All staff have name tags to show that they are affiliated to the school. The main door access is via a fob and the premises has CCTV.

### Medical Information/Gwybodaeth Feddygol

On occasions when it is necessary for medicines to be administered in school, parents must complete and sign a consent form which is available from the school office.

Health professionals visit the school periodically to test sight and hearing, also to talk to older pupils about personal hygiene and puberty.

### Sickness and Accident/Salwch a Damweiniau

If your child becomes ill and needs to go home, we will inform you immediately. If your child has a minor accident at school, we will complete an accident form which will be sent home with your child. In the event of a bump to the head, we will always contact you via telephone to let you know. For more serious accidents, these are reported to the Local Authority.

### Headlice/Llau Pen

Notices about outbreaks of headlice in your child's class will be published on Classlist and parents should treat accordingly.

### Cloakroom and Toilet

### Facilities/Cyfleusterau Ystafelloedd a Toiledau

Each class has a designated cloakroom and suitable toilet area within their own class which is cleaned along with the rest of the school on a daily basis.

### Safeguarding/Diogelu

As professionals, all school staff have a duty to report any concerns surrounding a child or their family, and have an obligation to share any information which may be relevant. It is the duty of the Designated Safeguarding Officers (Headteacher and Deputy Headteacher) and/or the Designated Safeguarding Governor to report any concerns without delay to the Central Referral Team if there is a concern around a child's welfare, including risk from neglect, physical, emotional or sexual abuse.

Our school also has a nominated Child Protection Governor which is Mr Calum Higgins (Chair of Governors).

The school has a child protection policy in place and all staff in the school follow the correct procedures where there are concerns or suspicions of child abuse.

Our first concerns as a school is your child's welfare and where we have general concerns, these will be raised with you, with a view to working with you to remedy the situation. However, concerns may be raised which require us to inform other agencies before we contact you. Should this be necessary, we want to reassure you that any concerns we have about your child will then be fully discussed with you in a way which is consistent with your child's best interests. Please remember that it is not the role of school personnel to make judgements or to draw conclusions, but merely to pass on





facts and evidence. As always, we would welcome your cooperation with us in these matters.

### Parents/Rhieni

Our relationship with parents and carers is extremely important to us and we work hard to ensure that we ensure effective and prompt communication through a variety of ways.

Every Friday, a weekly newsletter is sent out to parents to let you know any news or important information, forthcoming dates, attendance figures and also celebrates achievements. Hard copies of the newsletter can be requested at the school office.

We also use the app Classlist which provides information to parents from school. It also provides a safe platform for parents to communicate with school staff and with each other to ask questions or gather information.

Parent Council sessions are held regularly to allow parents an opportunity to come into school and work with us on making improvements. There are also opportunities to visit us to work alongside your child on a specific focus or to attend one of our sharing events to showcase what the children have been working on.

Each class posts photos on X (formerly Twitter) which also provide you with an insight into what your child has been learning and the experiences they have had in school. This can be found at @YsgolTycroes



Our website also provides information about our school.

Parents' Evenings are held in the Autumn and Spring terms. At the end of the school year, parents receive an annual report outlining their child's progress, and following this, a further parents' evening is offered to discuss any concerns with the report if necessary. The results from the Welsh National Tests are also made available following their completion.

Your views are very important to us and are vital in helping us to make improvements to our school, and you will be asked to complete a parental questionnaire at least twice during the school year, following which we will publish feedback and ways forward.

### Complaints/Cwynion

Any concerns should be raised with the class teacher in the first instance as many issues can be resolved at an informal stage. If your concern cannot be resolved, then your complaint should be put in writing to the Head Teacher who will endeavour to deal with the complaint as quickly and sympathetically as possible. If the problem is not one that is easily resolved, then it will be referred to the Governing Body. Your complaint will be listened to and dealt with fairly.

Please note that the Local Authority will not deal with any complaint. Their role is to ensure that the correct process has been followed.

In the event that the complaint is directed against the Headteacher, then your complaint should be taken directly to the Chair of Governors, who will call a meeting of the complaints panel and act accordingly.

We endeavour to deal with all complaints as speedily as possible and resolve them to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Ysgol Tycroes is a vibrant and happy school in the heart of the village of Tycroes.
